PROJECT DESCRIPTION: The Workshop format was designed by a special API Task Group on E&P Waste Management, and is cosponsored by API, DOE, and GRI., with the objective that it be available to individuals from every exploration and production company in the United States. The instructional format emphasizes team solutions of a practical case study. The learning environment is fast-paced and interactive, using group facilitation and discussion, case study work groups and lecture as appropriate.

PRESENT STATUS: All workshops sponsored by DOE will have been completed by December 10, 1992.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS: This series of workshops is in its second year and plans are being completed for calendar year 1993. Over 1100 people have attended to date with most paying \$250.00 for the privilege. Where demand is high enough private workshops are being offered on a company specific basis at up to \$900.00 per participant. The API chair, Ken Heideman (ARCO, Dallas, TX) announced at the last API E&P Department Task Group meeting that this is the most highly complimented workshop.

BACKGROUND: The Metairie Site Office has been participating in an API effort to enhance the oil and gas industry's performance in drilling and production waste management. MSO staff participated in the development of the teaching aid, the selection of the contractor, and the initiation of the workshops. From the beginning, it was apparent that getting and keeping the smaller independent producers involved was a problem. The API budget process did not allow for class sizes less than about thirty paid participants. The DOE sponsorship provided for much smaller class sizes and more complimentary positions.
